Remembering Charlie Weaver with Letters from Mama Monday, March 10 @ 10am

Fred Malone will portray the character "Charlie Weaver" and share some of the "Letters from Mama" that made Charlie famous. Fred will then conclude with the story behind the "Charlie Weaver" character, the life of Cliff Arquette, an Ohio native, with details of his local connections.

Writing About Ohio Tuesday, March 11 & 18 @ 10am

Session One: Writing a history book involves a combination of luck and pluck. In the case of *Ohio's Black Hand Syndicate*, David Meyers and his co-author decided to turn a chapter dropped from one book into an entire book of its own. In doing so, they were gambling that there was more to the story of a Marion, Ohio produce vendor and his extended family than they had originally uncovered. It turned out to be a story that was known to very few.

Session Two: Ohio's history is filled with surprises. It was once, as an example, illegal to sell colored margarine. Dig deep enough and you'll find people like Captain Samuel Brady, who, while fleeing a war party of Native Americans, leaped across the Cuyahoga River to escape. In this class, Mark Strecker will show you the process he follows to unearth such information and share the many resources he uses while researching a book.

Master of Library Science
from Clarion University in
2008. Through his education

write well-researched narrative history. His greatest passions are history and writing, followed closely by reading. He is also an avid comic book collector.



Exploring Ohio Waterfowl Identification

Tuesday, March 11 @ 2pm & Tuesday, March 18 @ 4pm (Class size limited to 20)

Learn waterfowl identification basics through classroom and in-field identification focusing on ducks found in Ohio wetlands. This class guarantees that you will leave knowing that not every duck is a mallard.

Session One: There will be a PowerPoint presentation and some hands-on wing identification. Feel free to bring your favorite Bird/Waterfowl Identification Booklet.

Session Two: This session will take place at the Big Island Wildlife Area where Officer Grote will share some of his favorite viewing locations. Bring your books and binoculars, or a spotting scope. Dress for the weather. When timed right, the Northern Migration allows you to see every species of duck common to Ohio in their full breeding plumage.

Officer at the Ohio Division of Wildlife for 18
years. He is a member of the Ohio Division of

Wildlife's Waterfowl training team, responsible for training other Wildlife Officers in waterfowl identification and regulations to prepare them for the field. Officer Grote is lucky enough to have Big

Island Wildlife Area in his area of assignment and he takes advantage of the northern migration to sharpen his waterfowl identification skills.



Build a Bouquet Wednesday, March 12 @ 4pm (Class size limited to 15)

This class will cover the basics of designing floral arrangements with the and tricks to designing with fieth flovers. With a step-by-step ou de on how to build a wildflower bouquet that you can take home and enjoy!

This 1.5hr course led by:

Hannah Edler, a Marion native, she grew up in the floral industry in a third generation flower shop, Hemmerly's Flowers & Gifts. Hannah developed her passion for floral design as a teenager and received her associate's degree in floral design and marketing from Ohio State University Agricultural Technical Institute. Hannah now works full-time at Hemmerly's and is the lead designer for weddings and special events.



Let's Get Cheesy Friday, March 14 & 21 @ 10am (Class size limited to 30)

Session One: Curious about how cheese is made? This short course covers a brief history of cheese making and the basic processes that go into making cheese. It finishes with simple techniques you can use at home to make small-batch fresh cheeses such as ricotta. Bring a love for good food and an interest in all things cheesy.

Session Two: Will include a tasting of cheeses from Black Radish Creamery.

for cheeses at the Ohio State Fair last year.

Human Trafficking Wednesday, March 19 @ 2pm


Human trafficking doesn't happen in our area, right? WRONG! In this class we will learn the basics of what human trafficking is, who is at

and a Registered Advocate with Senior Standing. Nikki has worked for Turning Point serving survivors of domestic violence for 12 years in three different roles.

Planting to Bottling: Behind the Scenes of Shamrock Vineyard Thursday, March 27 & April 3 @ 2pm

Session One: In this first class we will explore how the growing conditions of the grapes influence the flavor of the wine and gain an understanding of the general process of winemaking.

Session Two: This session will take place at Shamrock Vineyard. Thomas Van Creasap will take the class on a brief tour, focusing on vine management, proper pruning techniques, and their importance to the final product.

Each 1.5hr course led by:

Thomas Van S. Creasap, the grandson of OWPA Hall of Fame members Dr. Thomas and Mary Quilter. Van has worked at Shamrock Vineyard (founded in 1971/bonded in 1984) since he was a young boy mowing, harvesting, and anything else that would keep him busy. Just after graduating high school in 2000, he started working part-time while going to OSU full time, getting his bachelors in Business Administration in 2004. By his junior year, his grandparents' health began to fail and he went from a part-time employee to full-time. For many years, Van was the

youngest winemaker in Ohio, producing and selling wine to loyal customers even before he could legally drink himself. In 2003, Van took the reins of the family business, and in 2011 he and his wife Emily became the official owners of Shamrock Vineyard. He prides himself in teaching customers the same values his grandparents had and is proud to continue the legacy his

grandparents worked so hard to create. Van wears many hats - from working in the vineyard and the cellar to the mowing he has done since he was a child.


A Brief Introduction to Acupuncture & Eastern Medicine Tuesday, April 8 @ 10am

The Holocaust: Through the Lens of the Liberation Friday, April 11 @ 10am


This class will examine what was discovered during the liberation of the camps by the

Memorial and Education Commission, bringing over 30 years of Holocaust education experience to her role. As the Chief Learning Officer






Historic Marion Walking Tour Tuesday, April 15 @ 2pm

Northern University. His entrepreneurial journey started with various ventures in elementary school. In junior high he started mowing lawns to make money for his first car




