

SUMMER READING HAIR CHALLENGE gets community to take action/register and read



Thank you to all of the patrons, big and small, who took the time to register for our Summer Reading program!!!

The program's focus highlighted the importance of keeping kids and adults reading and engaged throughout the summer.

A challenge between Adult Services and the Youth Services created a fun rivalry for our staff. Registrations for the adults and the kids varied weekly. One week the adult registrations were ahead, and the next the kid registrations were ahead. As the weeks progressed, the hair colors started to bloom and patrons started to notice.

Near the end, we exceeded the director's requested goal of 1,887 registrations. As we wait for the final totals to come in, we are pretty sure we

will see over 900 kids and 1,020 adults who participated.

Additionally, this year's programs were very popular and drew families to fill the program room to capacity more than once.

Many kids have completed and returned their reading log sheets. Those who haven't turned in logs, have until August 10 to do so to claim their prizes. As for the adults, the winner of the Kindle Fire 10HD Tablet has been drawn from the hundreds of entries received.

A special thank you to the Marion businesses who generously donated prizes this year, and to the Marion Community Foundation Janis & Greg Swepston Family grant that helped underwrite the cost of the live programs.

To my delight(?), staff exceeded the goal and did a fantastic job making sure every person they encountered knew about the Summer Reading program, about the staff challenge, and was registered into the Summer Reading program.

Bottomline – the ultimate program success is encouraging the love of reading and lifelong learning by visiting the Library and using your library card to continue to do so.

ReadLocal Author Fair Returns 30+ authors participating




After a few years' hiatus,

their passion.





Our library has a variety of print and digital resources for DIY projects around your home. Each month the library has adds new books to the collection on a variety of home projects for beginners and those with more advanced skills.

If you cannot make it to the library, then try exploring some of our **digital collections** for home improvement books. The Ohio Digital Library collection of ebooks and digital magazines can be accessed either via the Libby App or on your computer by going to https://ohdbks.overdrive.com. There you can browse the "Do It Yourself" curated collection or search for specific topics and titles that are of interest to you. Download and read the books and magazines from the comfort of your home!



The Library also provides free access to Home Improvement Source, a database from EBSCO featuring full-text content from leading home improvement magazines and videos of popular home repair projects. All of the content is organized in an easy-to-use interface so quickly find the info needed. Content Includes: more than 130 full-text reference books, more than 40 full-text magazines and trade publications, 35,000 images not available anywhere else online, and nearly 100 videos of popular home repair projects.


Browse by subject or by genre to explore the history of music and popular culture. Each subject and genre has its own page sorted by date, presenting a chronology of a topic.
